Municipal Tax Rate Unchanged in 2013 Budget, but Utility Rates to Increase 20%; Deputy Clerk Appointed; County Tax Board Representative Discusses Changes to the Annual Assessment and Appeals Schedule; Beaver Dam Found to be Raising Stream Levels

The Borough Council met as usual during the months of May, June and July. During May, the Council awarded a contract to MECO, Inc. for \$159,567.65, most of which was State transportation aid money, for the reconstruction of Oscar Drive. This work was completed in July. It also adopted an ordinance eliminating residency requirements for all appointed positions that are not required by statute to be filled by residents. It also adopted an amendment to the ordinance governing the water and sewer utility raising minimum rates by 20%. Effective July 1, the minimum bi-monthly rate per dwelling went from \$310 to \$372. This will be reflected in bills issued in September. Chief Financial Officer George Lang explained that this increase was in large part necessary because of non-payment by owners of unoccupied houses. Though utility payments owed for those properties will eventually be collected, either upon sale of the properties or upon sale of the liens, with interest, there is a current shortfall that must be paid, since New Jersey municipalities and municipal utilities are not allowed by law to operate at a deficit. Furthermore, any shortfall is required to be anticipated in

the new budget, thus giving it a double negative impact.

At its June 10 meeting, the Council introduced the 2013 municipal budget, which includes revenue from the increased utility fees, but maintains the current municipal tax rate. It also appointed Rebecca Ord Barrett as Deputy Clerk. Also at the June 10 meeting, Monmouth County Board of Taxation representative Bernard Haney, who is the husband of Tax Assessor Donna Taylor, explained the new Monmouth County Assessment Program to the Council. Under the new system, which was established by the Legislature on an experimental basis for Monmouth County only, assessment notices will be distributed to property owners in November, rather than in January, and property owners will have until January 15, rather than April 1, to file appeals. This will allow appeals to be heard and decisions to be issued prior to the proposal of the municipal budget, the intention being to allow municipalities to propose and adopt budgets without the threat of having holes made in those budgets by adverse tax appeal decisions.

BOROUGH COUNCIL

At the June 24 meeting, the Council approved the use of Rochdale Avenue as part of the route to be used by cyclists participating in the New Jersey State Triathlon on September 20-21, 2014. Also at that meeting, Councilman Tom Curry told the Council how, in the course of kayaking on Assunpink Lake, he discovered that a very large beaver dam was impeding the flow of Assunpink Brook into the lake and significantly raising water levels in Roosevelt, thus contributing to the destruction of woodlands that is clearly visible, as he pointed out, in a comparison of current aerial maps with those from several years ago. Mr. Curry said that he had met with the maintenance supervisor of the Assunpink Wildlife Management Area, who is looking into ways of removing the beavers and the dam, perhaps involving the use of explosives by the State Police.

At the July 8 meeting, the Council approved the adoption of the municipal budget. It also awarded a contract for \$55,162 to J. Fletcher Creamer and Son for the emergency cleaning and lining of water lines between well #3 and the water treatment plant. The lines had become so clogged with mineral deposits over the years that well #3 had become unusable, leaving the water system dependent on one functioning well, a situation that clearly had to be corrected in order to protect public health and safety.

At the July 22 meeting, Councilman Jeff Ellentuck announced that the official Borough of Roosevelt website, which he has been working on, would soon be operational, and that it would include the newly-codified ordinances, which municipal attorney Richard Shakley is currently reviewing.

NJ School Report Cards

Starting with data derived from the 2011-2012 school year’s annual assessments, New Jersey has revamped its School Report Cards, now known as School Performance Report. To meet new federal requirements, the reports are “designed to enhance both educator and stakeholder engagement in discussion about how well a school is preparing their students for college and careers”, (NJ State Department of Education).

The School Performance Reports focus on metrics indicative of academic achievement as well as college and career readiness. Academic achievement is measured based on the previous year’s Language Arts and Mathematics scores on the NJ ASK. In the elementary setting, college and career readiness is measured based on the amount of

chronic absenteeism in a school. Research correlates attendance with future success in college and careers. In high schools, an added feature is the percentage of students taking algebra or advanced math courses.

The school’s performance in both academic performance and college and career readiness is benchmarked against the entire state as well as a cohort of peer schools. The state has determined a cohort of peer schools that educate similar students based on demographics such as the percentage of students receiving free or reduced lunch, the size of the school’s Limited English Proficiency (LEP) program or the size and type of Special Education programs offered. It is believed that these metrics will illuminate a school’s strengths as well as areas for growth.

Finally, the School Performance Report will feature an analysis of longitudinal data that will measure student growth.

RPS completed the Quality Single Accountability Continuum (QSAC) process this year. We are pleased to share that in the five areas that are evaluated (Instruction and Program, Fiscal Management, Governance, Operations, Personnel) the District Performance Review (DPR) was at least 92% and was, in fact, 100% in multiple areas. Health Notes:

"Janet's Law" Janet Zilinski, an 11 year old resident of Warren died of sudden cardiac arrest following a cheer-leading squad practice. On September 21, 2012 Governor Christie signed Public Law 2012, Chapter 51, requiring all public and nonpublic schools to have an automated external defibrillator (AED) on site in her memory. The bill received unanimous support in the Legislature, prior to being signed by the Governor.

As result of Janet's Law, all public and nonpublic schools, K - 12, will have an automated external defibrillator on school property, properly identified in an unlocked location beginning September 1, 2014. The defibrillator must be accessible during the school day as well as during school sponsored athletic events or team practices and within reasonable proximity to the school athletic field or gymnasium.

In addition, the law includes a requirement for each school to develop and maintain a medical emergency response plan to respond to sudden cardiac events, in order to be as prepared as possible to deal with these life threatening emergencies. The plan must contain a list of CPR/AED trained rescuers.

The law also requires that every athletic event, practice or competition, have a trained rescuer in attendance. The law states this requirement can be met by having a "State certified emergency services provider or other certified first responder" on site.

Janet's Law also requires that "notification is provided to the appropriate first aid, ambulance or rescuer squad or other appropriate emergency medical services provider" regarding specifics of each AED including its type and location.

In Memoriam Pearl Seligman

Pearl Seligman died peacefully at her home on Wed., Aug.7, just a couple of weeks short of her 91st birthday. She was cared for at home by her niece, Melissa Branco.

Pearl was one of the last of the original Roosevelt residents, having moved to the town as a teenager with her parents and younger brother in the 1930s. She loved Roosevelt and, except for a couple of years in California and England, she spent the rest of her life here.

Pearl's life was characterized by her sharp intellect and love of argument and the written word, as well as her keen artistic sense and talent, which she expressed in her collections of folk art from around the world, her sewing creations from her huge collection of textiles, and her own drawings. Pearl also loved children, and many Roosevelt residents of a certain age may remember spending hours in her brightly decorated home, drawing or writing under her cheerful supervision. She even had a printing press, way back in the 60s, and could create amazing brightly colored images of everything from kids' illustrated poems and stories to political flyers.

Pearl held many interesting jobs throughout the years, from working for Columbia Records to writing product manuals for Creative Playthings to running the Trenton State Museum Gift Shop. She was also a passionate political activist and proudly served as a delegate for George McGovern at the 1972 Democratic National Convention. Until the last few weeks of her life, when the world began to lose its relevance to her, the sound of MSNBC or CNN could always be heard on her TV.

Pearl is survived by her brother Josh Hecht and his wife Donna; her niece Jessica and her husband Jeff; and her nieces Melissa and Rebecca. Her husband, Ralph Seligman, died in 2011.
